Argument from Cause and Effect



"For every house is built by someone, but the builder of all things is God" (Hebrews 3:4).



For every effect, there must be an adequate cause.



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Adequate: sufficient, satisfactory, enough to meet a particular end.



There must be something in the cause that sufficiently explains the effect.

Is the Universe an effect?

Did the Universe have a cause?

There are only two possibilities that explain the existence of the Universe.

1. The Universe always existed, and is infinite.


2. The Universe was created, and is finite.


Is the Universe infinite?

To be infinite, the Universe must have . . .

1. No beginning.

2. No end.





In 1998 an experiment was started to measure the rate at which the Universe was expanding by observing supernovae.

"The original goal of our project was to measure the rate at which the expansion of the universe is slowing down. When you throw a rock in the air, the gravity of the Earth tends to pull it down and it slows down that rock as it is rising."

"The team expected the supernovae to confirm that the expansion of the universe was slowing down. But when the results finally came in, something seemed terribly wrong."

"The data showed that the distant supernovae were dimmer and therefore much farther away than the team expected. Instead of slowing down, the expansion of the universe has been speeding up with galaxies moving apart at greater and greater velocities."



The Universe is not slowing down in its expansion, it is speeding up.

It is speeding up so fast, that it will never crunch in on itself again!

"We are all used to the idea of an absolute zero of temperature. It is impossible to cool anything below -273.16° C, not because it is too hard or because no one has thought of a sufficiently clever refrigerator, but because temperatures lower than absolute zero just have no meaning -- we cannot have less heat than no heat at all..."



"...In the same way, we may have to get used to the idea of an absolute zero of time -- a moment in the past beyond which it is in principle impossible to trace any chain of cause and effect. The question is open, and may always remain open."

Energy in the Universe

Energy of the Sun: 4 x 10²⁶ Watts / Sec.
(100,000,000,000,000,000,000,000).

- Energy of the Universe: 2 x 10⁸⁰ Watts / Sec.

Energy in the Universe

- The Universe has 5×10^{53} Watts / Sec. times greater energy than the sun.
- The universe has a billion x a billion more energy than the sun every second.

Energy in the Universe

From what source did all of that energy originate?

- Only an eternal source of power could be the origin of that much energy.
- God is that eternal source of power!

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The Creator is wholly divine.



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Who caused God?

For every effect there must be an adequate cause.

God is not an effect; He is the uncaused cause!



 God has the reason for Himself inside Himself; He is infinite in existence.

• "I am because I am" (Exodus 3:14).



God is beyond physical existence.

"Lo, these are but the outskirts of his ways: And how small a whisper do we hear of him! But the thunder of his power who can understand?" (Job 26:14)



Review



The Universe exists.

It is either infinite or finite.



If the universe is infinite, then it cannot have a beginning or end.

The universe had a beginning, and will end.

The universe is NOT infinite.



The Universe is Finite

Either it created itself, or something created it.



If the universe created itself, then something came from nothing.

Something cannot come from nothing.

The universe did not create itself.



The Universe Has a Creator!

This Creator is either finite or infinite.



The Creator Must Be Infinite!

This Creator must be infinite in power.

This Creator must be different from His creation.
