Limitations of the Old Law (Part 1)

Many misunderstand the scope of authority of the Old Testament. It was misunderstood in the first days of Christianity as well. There are several illustrations given within the New Testament that exemplify the limited authority of the Old Testament. Let's look at a few of those illustrations.

In Acts 15, Peter says that the Old Law was like a yoke that one is not able to bear. A yoke is a harness that is put over the shoulder of a beast of burden and used for pulling plows, hauling water, or some other task of manual labor. Peter said the disciples were not to be burdened with the yoke of the Law any more (Acts 15:10). Paul wrote in Galatians 5:1, "Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, and be not entangled again with the yoke of bondage." In contrast to the unbearable yoke of the Law, Jesus said that his yoke was easy (Matthew 11:30).

In Romans 7:1-4, Paul compares the Old Law to a dead husband. While the husband (the Old Law) lived, the wife was required to be joined to that husband. However, when the husband died, she is free to be married to a new husband—the law of Christ. Paul's point is that just as a woman whose husband has died is free to remarry again, when the Old Law was nailed to the cross (Colossians 2:14) and put to death, God's people are now free to be joined to a new law—Christ's law—the New Testament.

In Galatians 4:1-6, the Old Law is compared to the tutor of an heir. However, once the heir comes of age, he has no more need for a tutor (the Old Law) and stands before the father as full heir and son.

Words of Comfort

And he that searcheth the hearts knoweth what is the mind of the Spirit, because he maketh intercession for the saints according to the will of God. And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose. For whom he did foreknow, he also did predestinate to be conformed to the image of his Son, that he might be the firstborn among many brethren. Moreover whom he did predestinate, them he also called: and whom he called, them he also justified: and whom he justified, them he also glorified. What shall we then say to these things? If God be for us, who can be against us? He that spared not his own Son, but delivered him up for us all, how shall he not with him also freely give us all things? Who shall lay any thing to the charge of God's elect? It is God that justifieth. Who is he that condemneth? It is Christ that died, yea rather. that is risen again, who is even at the right hand of God, who also maketh intercession for us. Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, For thy sake we are killed all the day long; we are accounted as sheep for the slaughter. Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us. For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, Nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Rom 8:27-39)

Man is a frail creature, whether he realizes it or not (Heb 9:27; Eccl 12). Sometimes we are reminded of our mortality by illnesses or near-death experiences. Death exists for man in the world because of Satan (Genesis 1-3). He is a formidable adversary (1 Peter 5:8). The book of Job gives the record of how Satan has (had) access to man directly for the means of turning us against God. However, even in the midst of the worst of Job's experiences (and they were horrible!). God ceased not to watch over him.

Paul made the point to his fellow Christians with the words above that we can/ should be absolutely convinced of the scope, power, and consequences of the love of God. We acknowledge the sufferings of Christ and what was accomplished thereby.

John began his first general epistle speaking inclusively (we) of walking in the light, having fellowship with God and one another, and having our sins and unrighteousness "cleansed". Then, with the next "stroke of the pen," John mentions Jesus as our advocate. He is in our corner, so to speak. Job's earthly friends were identified as "miserable comforters," but Jesus is uniquely, perfectly, superbly qualified and willing to aid us at our worst times as well as our best. (Romans 5:8-9).

Comfort that cannot be taken away is comfort indeed. We may have some great days when it is easy not to fear what Satan can do to us in the world, but we can ALWAYS have great days knowing that Jesus who has conquered death itself watches out for us. May we always receive the comfort God provides with His Word because of our wholehearted and patient obedience.
